SCORE Project comes to empower Cassava Farmers with New Opportunities



On January 22, 2025, the Ingabo Farmers' Syndicate signed a grant agreement for the implementation of the SCORE Project, funded by the Global Agriculture and Food Security Program (GAFSP). This four-year project was formalized by the Country Director of the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), Mr. Habte-Selassie Dagmawi, as the supervising entity, and the Chairperson of the Ingabo Farmers' Syndicate, Mrs. Cesarie Kantarama.

According to IFAD's Country Director for the East and Southern Division, the funds will be utilized to improve cassava productivity in terms of both quality and quantity, enhance farmers' capacities, address post-harvest challenges, and promote climate-smart agricultural practices in an inclusive manner. Mr. Habte underscored the project's goal, stating, "The SCORE Project aims to strengthen smallholder farmers' resilience to food and climate crises, thereby improving food security and livelihoods in rural areas. By investing in smallholder farmers, we enhance food security and rural resilience."



The Ingabo Farmers' Syndicate will implement the project, which is expected to benefit over 20,500 smallholder farmers. Of these beneficiaries, 46.4% are men, 53.6% are women, and 19% are young farmers, spanning 10 districts: Kamonyi, Muhanga, Ruhango, Nyanza, and Gisagara in the Southern Province; Rusizi and Nyamasheke in the Western Province; and Bugesera, Gatsibo, and Kayanza in the Eastern Province.

Speaking to the press, Mrs. Cesarie Kantarama, Chairperson of the Ingabo Farmers' Syndicate, remarked, "This project strengthens our capacity to combat climate change, improve cassava production, and empower smallholder farmers with the skills needed for smart cassava farming. Previously, we produced 14 tons of cassava per hectare. With this new pro-

ject, we expect to increase our yield to 50 tons per hectare."

Mrs. Kantarama emphasized the role of innovative farming techniques, such as Zai Pit Technology, and training programs that focus on climate adaptation, soil health, and water conservation. Additionally, the project will introduce climate-resilient cassava seeds that can withstand the adverse impacts of climate change, thereby boosting farmers' incomes.

She further affirmed, "Small-scale farmers are the backbone of Rwanda's food system. This project will empower them with the knowledge and tools they need to thrive."

The SCORE Project represents a significant step toward improving food security and fostering resilience among Rwanda's smallholder cassava farmers.

On Monday, March 10, 2025, the Institut Catholique de Kabgayi (ICK) hosted the signing ceremony of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the institution and the Ingabo Farmers’ Syndicate. This agreement aims to promote research, foster partnerships in various development initiatives, enhance awareness, and boost visibility.



The MoU was signed on behalf of the Ingabo Farmers’ Syndicate by its Chairperson, Mrs. Césarie Kantarama, accompanied by the Chief Executive Officer, Mr. François Xavier Mbabazi, and on behalf of the Institut Catholique de Kabgayi by its Vice-Chancellor, Father Prof. Fidèle Dushimimana.



Addressing the press, Mrs. Kantaram highlighted that the Ingabo Farmers’ Syndicate is an active organization collaborating with various local and international institutions, including the Ministry of Local Government (MINALOC), the Ministry of Agriculture and Animal Resources (MINAGRI), the Rwanda Agriculture and Animal Resources Development Board (RAB), and the Private Sector Federation (PSF), among others.

She also emphasized that the Ingabo Farmers’ Syndicate partners with global organizations such as the European Union (EU), the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), the Eastern African Farmers’ Federation (EAFF), and the World Farmers’ Organization (WFO).

Father Prof. Fidèle Dushimimana expressed his enthusiasm for the growing collaboration between the two institutions, emphasizing the importance of leveraging scientific approaches to drive development.

He encouraged both parties to work towards meaningful change and a transformational partnership.

Founded over two decades ago, the INGABO FARMERS’ SYNDICATE is dedicated to improving agricultural productivity, promoting agroecology, and creating economic opportunities for smallholder farmers across Rwanda. What began as a grassroots movement has grown into a model of resilience and innovation, bringing together thousands of farmers under one unified voice.

Their participation in the 2025 Agriculture Show was carefully curated to reflect this transformation. Visitors to the Ingabo stand were greeted with an engaging display of climate-smart farming practices, organic produce, digital farmer services, and innovative post-harvest technologies. One key feature was their presentation of ZAI PIT TECHNOLOGY that has come as an innovative solution in boosting cassava productivity, a technology now being scaled across member cooperatives.



Innovation Rooted in Farmer Realities

What set the INGABO exhibit apart was not just the technology, but how these innovations were rooted in real farmer experiences. For instance adapting to climate change. Demonstrations of agroecological intercropping techniques, developed through farmer field schools, offered practical solutions to issues like soil degradation and pest control without harmful chemicals.

Empowering the Next Generation of Farmers

The success at the show also stemmed from Ingabo’s strong focus on youth and women inclusion. Young agripreneurs within the syndicate demonstrated their value-added products and explained how training and through Ingabo has transformed their livelihoods. The judges were particularly impressed by the integrated approach to agri-business incubation and rural job creation.

One female entrepreneur, a cooperative leader from MBUYE Sector, Ruhango District, Southern Province named Alexia MUKAMUSONI shared how joining Ingabo allowed her to scale her cassava production and gain certification for seed multiplication. Stories like hers gave life to the syndicate’s motto: “Farming with dignity, led by innovation.”

Recognition and Impact

Winning the trophy at the 18th Rwanda Agriculture Show was not just a symbol

of excellence—it was validation of the inclusive, sustainable, and forward-thinking model that Ingabo represents. The award was presented by senior officials from MINAGRI and Rwanda Agriculture and Animal Resources Development Board (RAB), who commended the syndicate’s tangible impact on rural livelihoods and their role in advancing Rwanda’s National Agriculture Strategy.

“This award is a recognition of the power of collective action,” said the Syndicate President during the award ceremony. “Ingabo is proof that when farmers are empowered, organized, and equipped with the right tools, they can transform agriculture and feed the nation sustainably.”

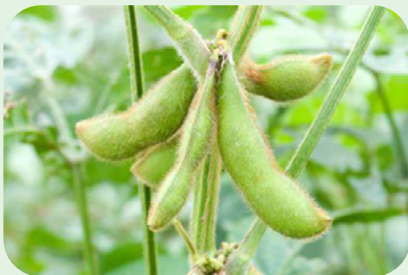
